Growing Opportunities (GO) Training Programs

Programs (GO Cook, GO Solar, GO Facility Maintenance) provide hands-on training and the ability to receive industry-recognized certifications

Ready To Work (RTW)

- Soft skills training for individuals

PATHWAYS FOR OPPORTUNITY

GO Hire Program

- Partial salary reimbursement incentivizes employers to hire City residents for new positions that pay a living wage
- Provides grant funding for upskilling of existing employees that includes industry certification/credential

EQUITABLE ENTREPRENEURSHIP

BEACON KITCHEN

Applied for three grants to support the development and expanded operational capacity of The Kitchen

- The Kitchen offers a variety of food storage, preparation, and packaging options for food and beverage entrepreneurs
 - Hourly plans or monthly memberships provide flexible cost options for users.

GO START-UP

A free, 4-week course offered by OED

- Serves as an "on-ramp" to the continuum of entrepreneurial business development and growth
 - The program was re-launched in Fall 2024 with refreshed content and format
 - Two cohorts under the new format
 - The majority of participants qualify as minority- and/or woman-owned businesses

5,550 Households Are Still Struggling

Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed (ALICE)

ALICE households **earn more than** the Federal Poverty Level, BUT not enough to afford a survival household budget. These households:

- · Work but cannot earn enough to reach the cost of living
- Still struggle to meet basic needs, and are ineligible for the supportive services that households in poverty can access
- Make tough decisions- can I afford childcare, my rent, a medical visit, or to repair my mode of transportation this month.

Interesting Findings: Financial Partners

100% of financial partner respondents believe that financial insecurity has INCREASED in the City of Charlottesville over the past three years

- Why?
 - Inflation
 - Housing Prices
 - Lack of Savings/Living Paycheck to Paycheck

75% of respondents do NOT believe adequate and accessible services exist for individuals who earn more than 50% Median Family Income (MFI) (\$33,589) but are still financially insecure

Interesting Findings: Nonprofit Partners

76%

Of nonprofit respondents believe that **financial insecurity has INCREASED** in Charlottesville over the past 3 years

WHY

- Clients LEAVING to try to find economic mobility/opportunity
- Clients cannot afford
 - Housing
 - Food
 - Essential Items
- Clients cannot secure employment that meets their costs
- Working with cuts & reduction in eligibility of critical benefits (SNAP)

- Staff Application Lead: Ashley Marshall
- Participation: August 2025 August 2027 (2-Year Program)
- Funding: Gates Foundation Funding to support salary for EMO SA + supportive funding for programming directed by EMO SA. ICMA will provide coaching, training, and technical assistance.
- Project: EMO SA will work across departments and external partners to identify strategic priorities and develop a tailored implementation plan informed by a **community-engaged codesign process** during their 2-year tenure.
